(N. Lawrence) Why need for demographic info?

(Bundrick) Welfare could make it explicit that info CANNOT be used in certain ways, because aggregate data CANNOT be separated.

(Yingst) Do we still have previous data? Can't control practices of future committees.

(Burke) Not available to committee.

(Bundrick) Committee only sees aggregate data

(Golonka-Duker) raw data is dumped?

(Alhaddad) Not through Class Climate anymore. Raw data IS available and stored.

(Burke) Consensus that demographic questions not be included?

(Rutledge) Forcing our students to take courses elsewhere; transferring online courses from York Tech—seems a disadvantage to USCL

Report to the USC Lancaster Faculty Organization February 6, 2015

People

Enrollment

As of February 3, 2015, 1255 students (headcount) are registered for Spring 2015. Final enrollment in Spring 2014 was 1368. There are still a few dual credit students to be registered for this semester, and additional second 8 weeks enrollment continues to be added. We are serving 121 BOL/BLS students at USCL as well this semester.

Athletics

Student-athletes' average GPA for Fall 2014was 2.843 with the baseball team averaging 2.991. Five student-athletes earned a 4.0 GPA while 28 student-athletes earned a GPA between 3.0 and 3.9.

There are home baseball games against the College of Southern Maryland next weekend: Saturday (2/14) at 1:00 PM and Sunday (2/15) at 1:00 PM.

Congratulations to Prof. Bob Bundy for being selected to serve as Chairman of the Lancaster County Council.

Congratulations to recent USCL alum, Kim Cunningham (BLS graduate in December 2014), who was recognized with the Student Social Justice Award at the recent MLK Breakfast in Columbia. Prof. Adam Biggs nominated Ms. Cunningham.

Budget

The campus mid-year budget review was Wednesday, January 28 in Columbia. There are no significant changes in our status, and we continue to stabilize our financial situation. The Spring 2015 budgeted revenue projections were lowered in anticipation of lower enrollment. Reductions made last March, continued careful monitoring of spending and a tripling of the Fall 2014 Palmetto College revenue (over previous Fall semester) have all helped with this stabilization. I will make a short budget presentation and share a separate handout at today's meeting.

Facilities

A new computer lab opened in Bradley 113 this semester.

Renovation and construction projects continue including BSN Nursing Simulation Lab in Hubbard, upgrades to science lab ventilation in Bradley, Phase II of Gregory Health and Wellness renovations.

Other items...

- I concluded this year's visits to **county council meetings** in USC Lancaster's service area last week at Fairfield County.
- Ten USC Lancaster students, Laura Carnes, Ashley Lloyd and I attended Carolina Day at the Statehouse on Wednesday, February 04, 2015. We met with the legislative delegation from USC Lancaster's service area to thank them for their support and to ask for their continued support of USC Lancaster and higher education in South Carolina.
- Progress continues on the agreement between USCL and USC Beaufort to create a pathway
 for students in our service area to Beaufort's bachelor degree in **Hospitality and**Tourism.
- Our 2015 commencement speaker will be the Honorable John Michael "Mick" Mulvaney, US Congressman from SC's 5th Congressional District. Commencement is May 2 at 2:30.
- The greater University's capital campaign, **Carolina's Promise**, concludes on June 30, 2015. I have two visits with local industry/corporations scheduled for Monday, February 9 to discuss possible support for USC Lancaster. More visits will be scheduled later this semester when two new industries in the county are fully operational.
- The **Educational Foundation of USC Lancaster** has scheduled a 5K Run, **Laps for Lancers**, as a fundraising activity on Saturday, March 21 here on campus. Events planned that morning include the run, a pancake breakfast and activities for families with children to enjoy. A USCL baseball game and events associated with Native American Studies Week are scheduled that day as well.

 events and seniors from Indian Land and Buford spent a half day on our campus in October;
 we have a seat on the School Improvement Council at Indian Land High School and are
 currently in the process of scheduling visits to high schools across York County]
- Targeted marketing outreach to prospective students [recall marketing report from my
 October 2014 FO report and see attached report for Spring 2015 marketing efforts below]

Teaching and Learning Spaces

- Construct and launch BSN Nursing Simulation Laboratory [in the final design phase, an RFP should go out in the next few weeks]
- Ready the upstairs Medford offices (old section) to become the Academic Success Center
 [design complete, needs to undergo a code analysis and then possibly launch as a project]

I have attached to this report a copy of the current draft of the Palmetto College schedule (two-way video and online) as well.

MAYMESTER & SUMMER COURSES. USC Policy HR 1.81 (regarding Summer compensation for faculty) has been adjusted to allow a bit more flexibility. (You may recall that it used to be that faculty could earn no more than 30% of their base pay over the entire summer, and no more than 15% of their base pay in any single summer session – e.g., Maymester, Summer I, or Summer II).

The revised policy states that faculty compensation for summer teaching may not exceed 40% of base pay, but there is no restriction on individual sessions. Campuses are allowed to work within this broad guideline.

Our policy will remain pretty much as it has been:

- 1) Faculty will be limited to offering no more than ONE three-hour course during Maymester. (4-credit hour courses can't be offered in Maymester.)
- 2) For the first TWO courses taught, a full-time faculty member will receive 2.5% of base pay per credit hour for the courses. (This means a 3-credit hour course will pay 7.5%; a 4-credit hour course will pay 10%.)
- 3) For any additional courses after the first TWO, a full-time faculty member will receive the regular overload rate of \$1000 per credit hour (except for natural science labs).
- 4) Adjunct and part-time faculty will be paid at the "overload" rate for all courses.

We are still going to have to follow the same procedure as last year. A course MUST have sufficient enrollment to cover instructional costs (generally 5 or 6 students, depending on the amount involved).

Any course with 2 or fewer students enrolled will be canceled. If a course has 3 or 4 students, the faculty member will be given the option of teaching it at a pro-rated level (60% or 80% of the normal stipiend). It would be very helpful if you would let your division chair know as early as possible if you'd prefer for the course to be canceled, or if you wish to be considered for the pro-rated amount.

Thank you for submitting your **FACULTY INFORMATION FORMS** for 2014. The peer review committees will be commencing their work on them, and the administrative reviews will go on simultaneously. Here is the timeline we have established for this year's administrative process:







Report

Lori Harris, Webmaster

- 1. Palmetto College campuses are in the very early stages of a redesign project for all of our websites.
- 2. While the <u>information</u> on our site is as current as the people who feed me the information keep it, the USCL website <u>design</u> has not changed in years BECAUSE I kept hearing that the greater Columbia campus was going to include us in a grand redesign project. That did not happen, but Palmetto College has taken up the charge. Summer Yarborough and Randy Rollings are leading the project.
- 3. I don't have a lot of information now about the timeframe or what the end result will look like, but there is an emphasis on scaling back to the most critical information that needs to be available online.
- 4. I have lately been cleaning up the website of old files, and this is what we have currently (numbers are approximate):
 - a. 700 html webpages in the standard template with the blue left navigation bar;
 - b. 1700 images;
 - c. Over 800 PDF documents;
 - d. Other support files;
 - e. Total: roughly 3300 files of all types.

Those are all the details I have at the moment, but as the project progresses, I will let you know of major developments.

Rights and Responsibilities Report 2-6

(Senate offices for which USCL should probably provide candidates include: Vice-Chair, Secretary, Executive Committee At-Large Representative, Manual Liaison, Columbia Senate: Committee on Faculty Welfare, and Columbia Senate: Special Committee on Conflict of Interest.) Please think about how you or your colleagues might be able to pitch in by serving in one of these roles.

APPENDIX #9: CURRICULUM COMMITTEE MOTION

The curriculum committee proposes the following three motions.

- 1) We move that the degree plan for the Associate of Arts and Associate of Science Degrees be amended as attached, so that the number of required hours of GSS be reduced from 6 to 3 in each case.
 - (This will cause our GSS requirement to match the requirement of the Carolina Core, meaning that a much wider range of students will be able to get one of these degrees while only taking the courses required for the 4-year degree they intend to get from another campus.)
- 2) We move that the format of the current degree plans be amended to the format as in the attached "Associate of Science Degree Plan Lancaster," (with similar adaptations for the Associate of Arts plan).
 - (This will allow students to find what courses are offered on our campus and which meet the learning outcome without going through the Carolina Core website.)
- 3) We that the committee description of the Curriculum Committee be amended as below:

The Curriculum Committee reviews new academic programs or proposed curriculum changes and recommends approved changes to the USCL faculty. Additionally, the committee will annually review and update the lists of Carolina Core courses offered at USCL that appear in certain USCL degree plans. The committee may also investigate various other issues concerning the curriculum at USCL.
