Congratulations to

Brittany Taylor-Driggers (art) who had three pieces—"Waiting," "Risk of Falling," and "Hold Tight" —accepted into the **Maria V. Howard Arts Center's 62nd National Juried Art Show**. Only 58 works from 45 artists were selected out of 82 artists and 276 works. The exhibit will run from May 3rd-August 18th, 2019 in Rocky Mount, NC.

Dr. Bettie Obi-Johnson (chemistry) who was selected for USC's **Distinguished Research Service Award** which recognizes USC faculty members who have demonstrated outstanding commitment to the internal research programs at the University of South Carolina.

USC Lancaster in our Communities

Prof. Chris Judge has been selected to serve as a stakeholder on the Lancaster City Revitalization Project.

The **Town-Gown Advisory Group** will meet for the last time this academic year on April 18 at the NASC. We will invite last year's participants in the Reading and Discussion Project to join this year's members to celebrate accomplishments and plan for the future of the group.

The **University of Possibilities** (middle school outreach program currently with A. R. Rucker Middle School in Lancaster) will continue with financial support from the greater university. Additionally, a local meeting was held with representatives from the J. Marion Sims Foundation, USC Lancaster, Palmetto College, and Mr. Derrick Huggins of USC, founder of the program. We discussed ways to expand the program to other Lancaster-area middle schools.

Budget

We continue to stabilize and improve our financial situation. We are on a course to continue building our carryforward again this fiscal year. Thanks to those who were able to attend the annual campus finance update yesterday. If you were unable to make it and would like to see the slides, please let me know.

The Upper Palmetto YMCA completed 16 months of management of fitness operations at the Gregory Center as of the end of March 2019. The **Gregory Family YMCA** membership is now just over 2700 and finances continue to be stable. More improvements/renovations will be under way soon for expanded exercise space and child watch space.

The **Palmetto College Salary Study** Committee is wrapping up its work. The committee's work will conclude with a report at the next PCC Faculty Senate next Friday at USC Union. Responding to the study's findings will be a multi-year process.

Legislative update:

There are hopeful and ongoing discussions about the passage of the South Carolina Higher Education Opportunity Act this year. The bill was filed by Senator Vincent Sheheen (Kershaw County). Facilities

Expenditure of current fiscal year deferred maintenance funding has begun with the determination of the scope of work for the lab renovation in Bradley. Sincere thanks to Prof. Jill Castiglia for her work in helping with the logistics and details of the lab renovation. The renovations will also involve Hubbard, Gregory as well as the parking lot that extends from Starr in front of Hubbard and over to the maintenance building.

Over the recent Spring Break, the following campus maintenance work was accomplishment:

- Resurfaced select white boards in Founders Hall
- Powerwashed the concrete elements of the façade of Founders Hall
- Cleaned chiller coils on A/C units
- Cleaned carpet in Bradley
- Cleared roof drains on all buildings

- You should soon receive an email with a link to my **annual evaluation instrument**. The email will come from the human resources office of Palmetto College. Thanks for your participation and feedback.
- Mr. James Smith, the newly hired Executive Director of Military Programs and Strategies with Palmetto College, visited our campus on Monday, April 1, 2019.
- The boards of the Lancaster County Commission for Higher Education and the Educational Foundation of USC Lancaster have together agreed to cover the cost of updating our **campus master plan**. The last plan was completed and presented in the Fall of 2008. The Boudreaux Group of Columbia will guide us through the update which will involve listening and feedback sessions this coming Fall semester. The updated plan will serve the campus in the coming decade. To see an electronic version of the 2008 plan, click here.
- The annual **Career Fair** was held on Wednesday, March 6, 10:00 to 1:00 in the Arnold Special Events Room. 40+ employers attended the event. Many thanks to Andrea Campbell and the TRiO staff for their work in making the event a success.
- Palmetto College is close to finishing its work on an initiative for Fall 2019 that is called Palmetto Pathway. The students admitted to this gateway-type program will officially be students belonging to USC Lancaster, but they will be housed and taught in Columbia. This program will serve students using the faculty expertise and support services of the Palmetto College campuses and when fully enrolled will add to our 2019-2020 enrollment numbers and revenue stream. This is a one-year (30-hour) program after which successful students then matriculate to a four-year program/campus.
- Give Local Lancaster, a 24 hour online giving event, is scheduled for Tuesday, May 7.
 Over 40 local non-profits will participate, and again this year the Educational
 Foundation of USC Lancaster will take part. Also this year, you can choose from 3 funds to direct your donation. They are: the Educational Foundation General Fund, the Native American Studies Center Endowed Fund, and the USC Lancaster Travel Study Fund. Events/activities will include exhibits, a publication, giving opportunities, a gala, recognitions, artwork, and other festivities. Sincere thanks to those serving on this committee. REPORT TO THE FACULTY 05 April, A.D. 2019

2019 USC LANCASTER COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES will be held at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 04 in Bundy Auditorium. Full-time faculty are encouraged to participate, and all adjunct faculty are invited as well. There will be a VIP reception at 1:00 p.m. in the Multipurpose Room prior to the ceremony (faculty are invited), with a reception for graduates and parents following the commencement exercises. If you have not already done so, please let me know if you are going to be marching. It is very important that we have an accurate count so that we can make sure there are enough chairs on stage.

FINAL EXAMS will be held May 01 – May 08 (May 06 & 07 for 2nd 8 week classes). The exam schedule is online at https://www.sc.edu/about/system_and_campuses/lancaster/internal/documents/academ_ic_student_affairs/exam_schedules/final_exam_schedule_spring.pdf

Please remember that per USC policy:

- No final examination may be held outside of the stated time without the special permission of the dean of the college concerned.
- In any course or laboratory which meets two or three times per week, no quiz, test, or examination may be given during the last two class meetings prior to the regularly scheduled examination period.
- In any course or laboratory which meets once a week, no quiz, test, or examination may be given during the last class meeting prior to the regular examination period.
- If an instructor teaches more than one section of the same course, students may transfer from one examination section to another with the instructor's permission.
- Students who are absent from any final examination will be given the grade of **F** on the course if they have not offered an excuse acceptable to the instructor. If excused, they will be assigned a grade of Incomplete, and may complete the course through a deferred examination (see below).
- Re-examinations for the purpose of removing an **F** or raising a grade are not permitted.

SUMMER & FALL 2019 PRE-REGISTRATION. Thank you to all faculty & staff who have been working with students for advisement for Summer/Fall 2019. Please continue to reach out and encourage them to get advised before the end of the semester. Last year, over 70% of returning students did not register until AFTER the end of the spring semester. Our goal this year is to have at least 50% of returning students complete pre-registration before the spring semester ends.

Student Life Director Karlee Christian sent out an e-mail this week about **FRESHMAN ORIENTATION for FALL 2019.** All fully-accepted incoming freshmen will receive an invitation to attend orientation, and they will be asked to register online for one of the sessions.

This year, we are moving to a one-day format for orientation (with parent orientation still in the evening), and there will be six (6) dates:

The plan (I think) is still for there to be at least one faculty representative from each division (as well as from the specialized degree programs) on campus for each session.

If you have a handout or information that you would like to have shared with students during the orientation session, please send it to Karlee no later than May 15 so she has time to make the copies (unless you prefer to make them).

TENURE & PROMOTION INTENT FORMS have been distributed to all full-time faculty and were due back in our office by March 15.

If you have indicated that you will seek Tenure or Promotion, make sure you are working with your Division Chair or with the Office of Academic & Student Affairs to identify external reviewers for your file. This process is outlined in the *Palmetto College Campuses Faculty Manual*, pp. 22ff. **The list of five potential reviewers was to have been completed by April 01 and is due in Columbia by April 15.**

ANNUAL ADMINISTRATIVE EVALUATIONS. The division chairs and I are working on the annual administrative evaluations. The goal is to have these ready for you by the last week of classes (before final exams begin).

COURSE EVALUATIONS – SPRING 2019. Thank you to those who responded to our request regarding the format for your student course evaluations.

Please remember that unless you notified our office that you preferred online evaluations, you will receive the traditional paper versions to be administered prior to the last day of classes.

Paper evaluations will be distributed (and online evaluations will become available) on Friday, April 12, with a remainder e-mailed to the student's USC e-mail account on a daily basis beginning April 15. (If a student has indicated an e-mail address other than the one assigned by USC, it is unlikely that he/she will receive the reminder notification.)

Paper evaluations are due back to the Office of Academic & Student Affairs (Starr 126) – and the online evaluation link will close – on the last day of classes, Monday, April 29 at 11:00 p.m. Faculty are encouraged to remind students of the importance of using their regular USC e-mail for all university-related matters.


FACULTY SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATES:

Justification:

This course will explore current perspectives on humor in the contexts of (i) the linguistic structure and psychology of humor, (ii) changing societal standards for humor, (iii) racial, ethnic, religious, and gender-based humor, and (iv) socio-political questions surrounding the use of these. Situating racial, ethnic, religious, and gender humor in a present-day milieu of heightened sensitivities, it will explore the boundaries between identity and offense. This course will compare and contrast different categories of humor, as well as explore the tensions between sincere characterization and offensive caricature in the realm of humor discourse.

Using linguistic humor as a lens through which to view interactions within and between social groups, the course will illuminate the relationship between language and humor, and show how humor can facilitate or impede civil discourse. The course will enable students to calculate the ways in which humor serves to articulate values, attitudes, opinions and concerns, and help them to understand the limits of ethnic, racial, and religious humor (i.e. when humor become offensive). It will further explain issues surrounding entitlements to use humor in various ways and in different venues (i.e. who is entitled to use/hear humor of a particular type and in what contexts), and will help them to analyze the mediums through which humor finds expression (i.e. print vs. oral delivery and printed word vs. illustration).

This course will require no previous introduction to its content, and will be accessible to students with little or no linguistic training. The course will be of particular interest to students majoring in anthropology, education, foreign language, history, business, global studies, journalism, pre-law, political science, sociology, amongst others.
