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USC Lancaster Faculty Meeting Minutes September 3, 2021

CALL TO ORDER: D. Lawrence, 1:02 PM

Moon-Kelly – are Indian Land classes still in the evening?

Collins – Yes. Plan to expand into the daytime openings

Obi Johnson – can you elaborate on the bonuses

Collins – everyone got a bonus. There was also merit based extras for some of the bonuses. Input from chair and deans.

Golonka – where are the PCs going?

Collins – still in the same place. This is in addition to the PC lab. Macs will go in the room where we robe up in commencement.

Obi Johnson – has that [bonuses] been distributed or will it be distributed?

Collins – submitted paperwork at the same time in August. Depends on Columbia as to when it will go into accounts. Estimate is the 15th or 30th of September.

Obi Johnson – one time bonus?

• Questions/comments from the floor for Catalano:

- Blackmon in chat: That would open us to Walmart folks to participate correct?
- Sellhorst We have a mandate from the Provost for being 75% face-to-face. When
 we look at this type of program and the other programs. How does this fit into this
 75% and when we are talking about more on-line classes, this seems to be the
 opposite of what the Provost is saying we must do.
- Catalano we have been doing online for a really long time now. He remembers a time when he had a student asked for online coursework. A few years ago we approved 100% BLS and BOL degrees online. This is not intended for us to go and market at the Walmart [comment in chat]. We don't anticipate this will be a change to anything we offer currently. It will hopefully fill up the courses we currently offer online. I'm not worried about what the Provost dictates, since it mostly applies to Columbia. I think this is a way to increase courses. During the pandemic, we had an increase in courses online. This change may serve some of the faculty who wish to serve online.The whole thing is that this is an evolving thing. This goes back to admitting people across the campuses. Lancaster has been used as a model for different aspects of the application process (20 credit hours, etc). Palmetto College probably does not need the campuses permission to advertise.
- Bundrick comment, about 2-3 years ago, we promoted improvements to the AA
 and AS degree that were rejected by the Senate. He is not sure this is the
 appropriate venue for this type of thing. If there is a decision to be made, this is

- probably the Senate's job. If the FO decides to take this up, he hopes it will go to the curriculum committee.
- Catalano They do not want to market or advertise this until they have the faculty backing. Especially in light of what happened with the Carolina Online program that happened at Columbia.
- Golonka concern about this potentially be false advertisement, since not all of the courses may be taken to meet the course requirements such as the sciences, math, and potential art. So, the concern is that we need good advising for this type of route.
- Catalano We did look at math, sciences, foreign language, and we do have the ability to offer all the courses to have a student earn an AA or AS. They may not get the courses they would prefer to take, but they can earn an AA/AS.
- Holland advising question. How will this impact the advising? Some of the advising has moved to Columbia.
- Catalano The advising starts at the home campus. Whichever campus the student
 is assigned to, they will do the advising. There are a number of aspects that need to
 be examined, such as how payments happened, etc. He sees this as a way to meet
 more students and get students into the programs.
- Parker Curious if there has been discussion of changing the name of Palmetto College to Caroline Online. Carolina Online makes a lot of sense, but Palmetto College, they [students] do not relate.
- Catalano Everything is on the table, including the name, but Palmetto College was the President Pastides' response. Please see the video for more response to the name.
- D. Faulkenberry

 in chat It would be great if the PC coordinator on each campus
 could be the advisor for the new online students and push that student directly into
 the 4-year completion program.
- o D. Lawrence will the money part be worked out before the program is offered?
- Catalano tuition will be the same. The money will be worked out through the Business Office, based on a number of credit hours that need to be sorted. The money will be divided, so even if we get part of it, we get part of it. Financial aid aspects were discussed as well (please see the recording).
- Sellhorst would the students applying [for the program] be totally online or would they be able, if they changed their mind, to take a class on campus? How is that going to work?
- Catalano they will be applying to come into an associate's degree. No where would
 it say a 100% online degree, but it will be marketed that they can do that. The
 application form would be the same application form. This is just to get them in the
 door.
- Moon-Kelly With the online classes, with my classes, I have a policy with any student that has COVID or in quarantine, they switch to a hybrid model. If we had a person in the Peace Corps or the National Guard, and they get deployed, would there be an option for them to go online.

- Catalano we have to allow those students to be accommodated and we are required to do that. If a student is already online, they cannot become more online.
 They would not be treated any differently than any other student in that situation.
- Catalano closing thoughts some of the other campuses have made resolutions in favor of this. If you have questions, let him know by email. If you have questions or concerns, let your senators know. I cannot imagine anyone not wanting to let in more students.
- Lekan I would not advocate for a formal resolution. Sumter is doing a formal resolution, but Union is not and thinks Salk is not as well. Thinks all we need to do is have a discussion. Paused to see if anyone in the FO wants to do anything.

• Questions/comments from the floor for Lekan:

- Moon-Kelly questions for Lekan for online class offered asynchronous or adjusted due to COVID19 issues, would absences count based on the work they turn in. If they do not submit like 10 assignments in a row, do we count them as absent?
- Lekan I think you are saying, that if you have an asynchronous course, and have not heard from at student, you should treat them as a student not showing up in a face-to-face class, report them using that form. In terms of excessive absences, this would be within that area.
- Moon-Kelly clarified the situation and example. Please see the recording.
- Lekan if you get a student that disclose to you, the instructor, that they have been exposed to COVID, then refer them to Nurse Hinson. Also, this means that the instructor should notify Nurse Hinson that a student has reported this to us. This is within our rights and responsibilities.
- o There was mention that this was confirmed by Tracey Mobley Chavous.

Academic Success Center – Dr. Dana Lawrence, report submitted (Appendix 3)

- New hires for fall. Oliva Faulkenberry for several nursing related courses and David Lothers who will be tutoring various courses.
- In Spring, Dana will be on sabbatical. She is stepping down as Director of ASC and Pat Lawrence will assume the role of Director.
- Both virtual and in-person tutoring. Most students appear to prefer in-person.

Director of Institutional Research and Effectiveness – Shemsi Alhaddad, report and documents submitted (Appendix 4a, 4b. and 4c)

- In April, she began this position and in the summer determined that we do not report items in a systematic manner that we are required to report on (see Appendix 4b for the items we report).
- Self-reporting will be helpful in future for these reports (Appendix 4b).
- Alhaddad needs this information near the end of the academic year in Spring and would like faculty to keep track of this information.

- She suggests that faculty pull the items out that are done by that faculty member from Appendix 4b, and throughout the year faculty can make a note in that column or item. That may help also with organizing FIFs.
- The items that we report was sent to all faculty by Alhaddad on 9-3-21 (*items we report.docx*). This document is Appendix 4b.
- Also requested that if faculty have items that they do that do not fit any of these categories that faculty let her know so she can add those items to this list.
- Submitted to faculty in this email was also the report which is mostly spreadsheets with narrative (Appendix 4c).

Questions/comments from the floor:

- There was a question about using the form in Appendix 4b and whether or not faculty might want to restructure their FIFs to reflect the items that are reported within this required report.
- The answer no, Alhaddad does not wish to look at FIFs, is not recommending restructuring the FIFs, but self-reporting and keeping track of the items within Appendix 4b will help with the report as Alhaddad needs the information at the end of the Spring term for the report.

Report to the USC Lancaster Faculty Organization September 3, 2021

COVID-19

Campus Status: Following last month's ruling by the SC Supreme Court and communications from President Pastides and Chancellor Elkins, face coverings are now required in all campus buildings at USC Lancaster.

New case count for this week: 4 students

August 2021 positivity rate: 3.62% (3 testing sessions, 221 total tests with 8 positives)

SC DHEC continues to coordinate drive through COVID testing for the community on the USC Lancaster campus in the parking lot on the east side of Carole Ray Dowling. Testing is available Monday-Friday, 9:00 to 4:00.

USC Lancaster will host on-campus **vaccine clinics** throughout the semester. DHEC will administer the vaccines with all three available vaccines as options. Our <u>Campus Health</u> page contains all of the details.

Ongoing testing: We are in the process of finalizing a plan for ongoing testing for Fall 2021. More information will be shared soon.

Between May and July 2021, USC Lancaster distributed federal funds to students received from the **CARES Act for colleges and universities**. Approximately 513 students received funding amounts of either \$363 or \$763 depending on other financial aid factors. A total of \$285,565.00 was distributed to assist our students with financial hardships related to the global pandemic. Though no funds have been awarded for the 2021-2022 academic year yet, we do anticipate a 3rd distribution of funds.

Please remember that the university offers work-life balance and wellbeing support through our <u>Employee Assistance Program</u> (EAP). These services are especially helpful in times of adjustment.

Indian Land Location: Renovations to the automotive technology building at the former Indian Land High School for our permanent use have begun. The new space will include 4 classrooms, office space, restrooms, and storage areas. We will host a ribbon cutting and open house in January upon completion for the Spring 2022 semester.

Facilities

Campus Building and Area Updates:

Hubbard Hall and Starr Hall parking lots – Construction has been finished and asphalt striping was completed just in time for the first day of classes. This is a great improvement for campus parking.

Gregory tennis courts – renovation is complete, and all the courts have been resurfaced, wind screens replaced, and awnings installed. Three generous community partners donated to this effort: Founders Federal Credit Union, Comporium, and Nutramax Laboratories.

The Starr Hall renovation projects should conclude in the next few weeks.

- Remodeling Starr Hall lobby and Business Office; installed automatic door openers on three exterior doors (to be complete by the end of September)
- · Resurfacing main parking area in front of Starr, Medford and Hubbard
- Renovating Indian Land High School automotive shop into USC Lancaster's own classroom building
- Contracted out Crawford Rose Garden redesign options based on feedback in Campus Master Plan.
- Pressure washed Bradley, Founders, Medford, and the USC Lancaster sign at the bypass intersection
- Completed roof work on Bradley, Medford and Starr
- Replaced HVAC unit for Founders Hall
- Renovated Student Center in Starr removed fabric wall, installed sheetrock and painted, installed new ceiling tiles, lighting, and water feature on patio
- Converted storage closet in Student Center into a faculty/staff canteen
- Painted Medford computer lab, security office, and Palmetto College office in Hubbard (added new graphics to Palmetto College glass entrance)
- New flooring in security office
- New furniture in Medford glass study room
- Resurfaced tennis courts, new canopies, windscreens and practice wall, installed new sponsor boards, repaired fencing, trimmed trees around courts, refurbished benches
- General landscaping improvements
- Wi-Fi and computer lab upgrades; addition of campus webcam focused on Crawford Rose Garden area
- Creating an Apple lab in Bradley for campus and community use
- New graphics on USCL bus
- New admissions recruitment kiosk purchased for Starr Hall



Legislative Update and State Funding News

The state budget was finalized in late June, and USC Lancaster will be receiving the following allocations: Increase in recuring operations funding by \$860,436 and deferred maintenance funding: \$6,498,490. There was no tuition increase for USC Lancaster students for this academic year—the third year running.

Other items...

- The 2022 rankings are just out, and **USC Lancaster was again ranked the #1 two-year campus in South Carolina by niche.com**. This is the fifth year in a row that we have been so ranked. Congratulations to our faculty and staff for their dedication to the success of our students and to the fulfillment of our campus mission.
- As of this week, USC Lancaster's **Annual State Accountability Report** has been completed. Many thanks to **Dr. Shemsi Alhaddad** for her dedication in completing the report with thoughtful and meaningful narrative and data.
- **Bonuses**...Bonuses for full-time, permanent faculty and staff have been submitted and processed. Due to the timing of the suspension of HR payroll rules that prohibited bonuses last academic year, faculty will receive their bonuses in the next several weeks. Thank you for your dedicated work and support of the campus mission over the past 18 months during a period like no other. It has not been easy, and your efforts are appreciated.
- Update on the collaborative virtual Summer 2021 DEIA Internship Program:
 The program ran this past summer between June 1 and July 23 and had 14 interns (3 were from USC Lancaster). Sixteen USCL faculty members and 3 staff members participated as facilitators and mentors. Many thanks to those who took part in this important and successful initiative.
- **Horizon Grants**: Information about Horizon Grants offered through the Arras Foundation can be found here: https://arrasfoundation.org/horizon-education-grant/. The next deadline for submission of a grant application is October 1, 2021.
- **Apple Lab**: We received grant funding in late Spring 2021 to set up an Apple Lab on the USC Lancaster campus. The grant stipulates that the lab will be used by the campus and the community. The lab will be located in Bradley 102 and will be completed this semester pending supply chain cooperation and equipment availability. The lab will contain approximately 15 each of the following pieces of Apple equipment: MacBook Pros, iPads, Apple pencils, and iMacs. Attached are tentative design plans for this space. Blake is assisting with coordination and set up.

REPORT TO THE FACULTY ORGANIZATION September 3, 2021

1. Offering Associates in Arts and Science in an Online Format.

Palmetto College wishes to market these degrees as available in a fully online format. Please note that the degrees have already been approved for 100% online delivery by the Board of Trustees. The online option is especially attractive to military populations, and it will expand our overall reach. Special guest Associate Provost Catalano is attending our meeting to answer questions. If the USCL FO wishes to consider a formal resolution for this initiative, possible language is included at the end of this report.

- 2. Welcome to New Faculty Member McKenzie Lemhouse, Instruction and Outreach Librarian. McKenzie earned her M.L.I.S. from the University of South Carolina in 2020 and her B.A. in English Literature & Language from Winthrop University in 2016. Her Master's coursework focused on Archival Studies and Preservation Management. She has previously worked in museums, special collections, and academic libraries. McKenzie's coordinates library instruction and outreach at the Medford Library.
- **3. Faculty Advisor Workshops.** Online synchronous advising workshops will be offered throughout the semester by Asheley Schryer, Director of Student Success and Retention. These workshops will be 45 minutes and require completion of a FERPA component. Workshops will provide an overview of the advising program including some recent changes, share advising best practices, and introduce a new advising notes form. If you are unable to make it to the scheduled sessions, Asheley will be happy to schedule a session for you at an alternative time. To sign up for a workshop date, click here.
- **4. Early Alert Notices.** We know the importance of connecting with students early and often. Research has shown that early interventions (occurring within the first six weeks) are ideal. - **5. Target X Pilot Team:** Palmetto College has adopted Target X as its software management system for recruitment and retention efforts. USCL is in the process of setting up a team of faculty members to pilot the use of Target X for advising. In addition to learning how to use the system, the team will provide feedback to Asheley Schryer to make sure that the software is best tailored to our campus needs.
- **6. Faculty Advising Survey.** In addition to this fall's faculty advisor workshop, we want to make sure we are providing resources that address faculty needs. To ensure we are focusing on relevant topics, we have created a survey. Please submit your feedback so that we can create and connect advisors to important supplemental information.
- 7. USCL Student Counseling Services. We are in the process of filling a vacancy in the full-time counselor position. The job posting may be found here: https://uscjobs.sc.edu/postings/104121. While we are engaged in the search process, MyGroup will be contracted to provide counseling support for students. This is a group that has been utilized in the past. We are finalizing details of the contract and should have updated information on the website in the next two weeks. Brent will be staying on part-time for a while and Fran will continue to be a force for creative goodness in our community. 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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Physical Location and Description

University of South Carolina Lancaster (USCL) is a regional campus of the University of South Carolina (UofSC). We serve six counties in the central Piedmont: Lancaster, Chester, Chesterfield, Fairfield, Kershaw, and York. The northern side of our service area consists of the #3 and #4 fastest-growing counties in South Carolina. In 2018 USCL opened a satellite campus in the town of Indian Land, SC to accommodate the increase in demand for classes north of the main campus.



Physically, USCL consists of three sites: The main campus is in the

City of Lancaster, the Native American Studies Center is two miles south of the main campus in
downtown Lancaster, and the Indian Land satellite campus is 18 miles north of the main campus.

The USCL main campus consists of eight building. Founders Hall, Hubbard Hall, and the Bradley Arts and Sciences Building are designed for instruction. Besides standard classrooms, there are three large lecture halls, two auditoriums, five instructional computer labs, an art studio and gallery, five science laboratories, and a nursing simulation laboratory. These three instructional buildings also house most of the faculty offices. Normally USCL also holds public events in those buildings, like theater performances, art gallery receptions, K-12 science fairs, and high school Honors Day.

The Medford Library building also contains a computer lab, the Academic Success Center, and TRiO programs. Medford Library is an academic library that is open to the public. The librarians provide access to physical and digital media, teach students to conduct research using library resources, and host library-related events. There are computers in the library that members of the Lancaster community can use. The Academic Success Center (ASC) is a free tutoring lab and writing center where USCL students can develop their learning and writing skills. TRiO programs are federally funded programs designed to support students who face challenging circumstances. These include students who are first-generation college students, students with disabilities, and students from low-income households. Most USCL students qualify for TRiO services.

Starr Hall is dedicated to student services. This includes the Financial Aid Office, the Business Office, and Disability Accommodations, as well as Student Life, the bookstore, vending, and the Student Center.

USCL's main campus is the home of Gregory Family YMCA. In addition to cardio and weight training equipment, the YMCA has handball, racquetball, volleyball and tennis courts, and an indoor swimming

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pool. The Carole Ray Dowling building contains an exercise science laboratory and a community room used for special events. The final building is dedicated to security and parking enforcement.



The Native American Studies Center (NASC), located downtown, is a top attraction in the Lancaster area. It consists of a large gallery, archaeological research spaces, and faculty offices. The gallery is open to the public. Normally the NASC hosts an in-person lunch-and-learn series that attracts tourists and locals alike to downtown Lancaster. NASC also hosts special events, like Native American Studies week and a Native American craft show during the City of Lancaster's annual Christmas event.

Currently the Indian Land location is only used for classroom instruction. The location is expected to expand in the near future as both the Indian Land population and the demand for classes increases.

Academic Profile

The website Niche.com ranks universities based on several key criteria including academics, cost, facilities, and faculty credentials. For the past four years USCL has been ranked the #1 community college in South Carolina and has remained in the 97th percentile of

community colleges across the United States.

USCL offers four associate degrees: Associate of Arts, Associate of Sciences, Associate of Science in Business, and Associate of Science in Criminal Justice. Students can remain on the Lancaster campus to earn baccalaureate degrees through USCL's partnerships. USCL partners with the UofSC College of Nursing to offer a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree, which is ranked the #1 best RN program in South Carolina by RegisteredNursing.org. USCL is also a member of Palmetto College, a unit of UofSC. Palmetto College offers baccalaureate degree-completion programs online. Students who enroll in Fiscal Year 2020–2021

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Palmetto College through USCL work towards a bachelor's degree in one of 19 majors while benefiting from student services available on the Lancaster campus. USCL also participates in Palmetto Pathways, a program that allows qualified USCL students to transition to UofSC's Columbia campus after one year.

State Agency Strategic Plan and Measures

A. Education, Training and Human Development

1.1. Attracting and Enrolling Students

As a state agency, USCL primarily works towards the statewide enterprise strategic objective of Education, Training, and Human Development. The objective states that we should strive to elevate the level of educational preparedness of South Carolinians. The first step we take towards this objective is to attract a student body that is representative of our service area. We schedule regular recruitment efforts throughout our service area and provide outstanding admissions and enrollment support to all students. One way we measure our success in recruitment is by counting the total number of applications for admission. In Fall 2020 we received 2583 applications, a 17.6% increase over the previous fall. We also count the total number of students who register for classes. This is called the headcount. In Fall 2020, our headcount was 1810, a 10.4% increase over the previous fall. Both measures provide strong evidence that we have been successful in attracting and enrolling students.

1.2. Student Retention

Our next step towards elevating the level of educational preparedness of South Carolinians is to retain registered students until they graduate or successfully transfer to a different university. The most recently calculated retention rate of first-time, full-time, degree-seeking freshmen reported by the SC Commission on Higher Education (CHE) is not from FY2020-2021. It shows the proportion of these freshmen retained from Fall 2018 to Fall 2019. The proportion was slightly less than we expected: 48.9% rather than the expected 53%.

One approach USCL takes to increasing retention is to create an academic support network for students. We maintain a low student-to-faculty ratio, thereby allowing students and faculty to have meaningful interactions. In FY2020-2021, the ratio was 14-to-1, better than the previous year's ratio of 15-to-1. Beyond interacting with their instructors, USCL students also have access to the Academic Success Center (ASC). The ASC offers free tutoring from well-qualified staff as well as a Writing Center dedicated to developing students' writing skills. During FY2020-2021 fewer students than expected sought help from the ASC. Although the reason for the decline isn't known with certainty, there are several possible factors: The ASC only offered virtual tutoring, there was a tutor shortage as no new tutors were hired, and there was reduced availability of tutors. The director stated that the ASC will offer both in-person and virtual tutoring going forward and expects the number of students seeking assistance to increase. While the ASC is available to all students, TRiO programs are federally funded programs that support first-generation college students, students who come from low-income

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households, and students with disabilities. In FY2020-2021 the USCL TRiO program was awarded a five-year grant in the amount of 1.6 million dollars. TRiO programs provide qualified students with academic support including tutoring and advisement. They also host community-building activities and events that allow students to support each other and support the Lancaster community. USCL students also have access to a wide range of support services, including disability accommodations and personal counselling.

USCL also works to increase retention by making education more affordable. One way we measure affordability is in the number of endowed scholarship funds held by the Educational Foundation of USC Lancaster. In FY2020-2021 the Educational Foundation had 159 endowed scholarship funds, an increase of three scholarship funds over the previous year. In total USCL awarded \$335,735.75 in scholarships to 319 unduplicated students. This is an increase from the previous year when \$217,499 was awarded to 176 unduplicated students. USCL's Financial Aid Office hosts an annual Financial Literacy Week that consists of lectures and activities that are open to all USCL students. The student loan default rate is calculated using a three-year span for each cohort. The campus goal is to minimize the default rate. The most recently reported cohort began their loan period in 2018. Their default rate was 13%. This is a seven-percentage-point reduction from the 2017 cohort, who had a 20% default rate. USCL did not raise tuition during FY2020-2021. We expect that our efforts towards making education affordable for students in our service area, along with services and support we offer, will increase our retention rates in the upcoming years.

1.3. Student Success and Graduation

USCL uses the SC CHE definition of student success, which applies to 150% of program time: For associate degrees 150% of program time is 3 years; for bachelor's degrees it is 6 years. For each cohort of students, the *success rate* is calculated by counting the number of students who graduate or successfully transfer to a different institution within 150% of program time, as well as those who remain at the same institution the fall after 150% of program time. The total is divided by the size of the cohort. Like the retention rate, the most recently calculated success rate reported by the SC CHE is not from FY2020-2021. It is for the 2016 cohort, for whom 150% of program time ended in 2019. USCL attained a 66.4% success rate, exceeding our target of 65%.

The most recently reported graduation rate of first-time, full-time, degree-seeking undergraduates is also for the 2016 cohort. It was 20.1%, slightly higher than the average of 19.8% for public two-year institutions in South Carolina. In AY2020-2021 USCL awarded 135 associate degrees, lower than our target of 153 degrees. During the same year, USCL hired a new Dean of Academic and Student Affairs, and a new Director of Student Success and Retention. USCL also adopted Target X Retention, a program that allows USCL Student Success and Retention staff to track student progress in their programs, and to use a data-driven approach to improve student retention, success, and graduation rates.

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2.1. Student Wellbeing, Citizenship, Advancement and Career Training

The statewide enterprise strategic objective of Education, Training and Human Development states that we should prepare South Carolinians to lead a healthy and productive life, including success in a job or career and in the community. To attain this goal, USCL faculty and staff hosted events and activities to engage students beyond the classroom.

With a focus on health and wellbeing, USCL students are encouraged to make use of the on-campus YMCA either by using membership benefits or by enrolling in physical education classes. During FY2020-2021, USCL's Counselling Services hosted three mental wellness workshops on mindfulness and stress-reduction. USCL's Student Life hosted a variety of community-building events. Eight were opportunities for students to network in a relaxed setting, such as painting events and coffee or ice cream socials. Seven events were aimed at good citizenship. They raised awareness of and increased student involvement in social matters. These included preparing care packages for troops overseas, blood drives, events to raise awareness of human trafficking and domestic violence, and a crime-prevention workshop. Nine events, hosted by a variety of USCL organizations, focused on US history and culture. TRiO Programs connected students with the community by hosting five drives for food, coats, and pet supplies that supported organizations like United Way and the local animal shelter.

To increase students' productivity with the aim of future success in a career, USCL held several research-related events. During FY2020-2021, USCL's Research Club hosted continuous virtual events on multiple platforms that extended beyond the USCL campus to include faculty and students from other UofSC campuses. These included seventeen faculty presentations on research and scholarly spaces, eight workshops to prepare students for research, a series of 30-second research tips hosted by Medford Library staff, five student research presentation, and five presentations of Graduation with Leadership Distinction (GLD) e-Portfolios. A GLD e-Portfolio is a culmination of a project completed by a student in the GLD program. The Research Club also had a ten-part Instagram takeover series called A Day in the Life of a Professor with the goal of removing barriers to student research.

USCL students participate in the arts and athletics. During FY2020-2021, six USCL theater students earned awards in five categories through the South Carolina Speech and Theater College Festival. USCL is a member of the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA). We have four NJCAA athletic teams: baseball, men's soccer, women's soccer, and women's volleyball. In FY2020-2021, the men's soccer team were the NJCAA Region 10 regular season and tournament champions. Thirty-two USCL student-athletes were awarded the NJCAA All-Academic honors, which is awarded to student-athletes who pass at least 12 credit hours with a grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher while their sport is in season. For example, baseball competes in the spring and so their players are honored based on their spring semester coursework.

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To aid in student success in a job or career, USCL hosts two career-oriented lecture series: Careers in Science and Careers in Business. These lecture series allow current students to make connections with people working in their chosen career. In FY2020-2021 there were ten career-oriented lectures. Four were given by former USCL students who are currently in advanced educational programs like pharmacy school. The remaining lectures were given by professionals in those careers. USCL also provides support services for students pursuing employment. USCL's Career Services offers career coaching, help in writing resumes, and mock interviews. USCL's Internship Director adopted Handshake, the leading career site for college students to access internship and job searches. In FY2020-2021, nineteen students were accepted to internship positions through this tool. USCL regularly partners with Arras Foundation, a Lancaster area service organization focused on community engagement and growth. During FY2020-2021 USCL and Arras Foundation created a collaborative summer internship program focused on diversity, equity, and inclusion in our community.

Although USCL is primarily a two-year college, our students can earn baccalaureate degrees through our partnerships with UofSC College of Nursing and Palmetto College. The Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree offered through the College of Nursing currently accommodates up to 48 upper-level students. In AY2020-2021, 46 students were enrolled in this upper-level program. Lancaster students can enroll in any one of 19 degree-completion programs through Palmetto College. Two of these degrees, the Bachelor of Liberal Studies (BLS) and the Bachelor of Organizational Leadership (BOL), are accredited through Palmetto College. The other seventeen degrees are accredited through other UofSC campuses. In AY2020-2021, ninety-three Lancaster students were enrolled in the BLS and BOL programs.

USCL aims to develop the whole student. Outside of the classroom, students have access to activities that promote healthy lifestyles, make lasting connections with peers, make an impact on the community, and become experienced in research or their future career. Students also have the opportunity to advance academically, beyond an associate degree, without leaving Lancaster.

2.2 Outstanding Faculty

We strive to offer our students a first-rate education, which means hiring and retaining first-rate faculty and staff. In 2020, our faculty consisted of 52 full time faculty members, along with two deans who teach part time, and three retired faculty members who continue to teach full time. In 2020-2021 we celebrated Dr. Richard Vanhall, our longest-serving faculty member, who has been teaching at USCL for fifty years.

The normal teaching load for each faculty member is equivalent to 12 credit hours per semester. This is typically four courses but may vary slightly depending on the academic discipline. Faculty members who engage in scholarly research may request a workload reduction equivalent to a one-course reduction per year. To promote research, USCL has a budget of \$70,000 for the USCL Faculty and Staff Research and Productive Scholarship Award Program and for faculty travel to scholarly conferences.

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Both students and the university benefit from a faculty member's scholarly research: the faculty member and the university gain recognition by outside professional organizations; the faculty member may be awarded external funding by way of grants; and students experience cutting-edge advances in the faculty member's area of research. At USCL faculty engage students in research through the Research Club and UofSC-sponsored grants, such as the Magellan grant program. Students may earn one or both graduation honors: Graduation with Leadership Distinction and the Undergraduate Research Award. During FY2020-2021, USCL faculty disseminated their scholarship through 32 publications, 62 presentations, and 71 creative works. They were awarded 25 grants, mentored 19 students in research, and participated in 100 other scholarly activities, including peer-review of scholarly work and professional consultations.

During FY2020-2021, Professor of Exercise Science, Dr. Sarah Sellhorst, was awarded the inaugural South Carolina Academy of Science Two-Year Institution Teacher of the Year Award. Professor of Chemistry, Dr. Li Cai, was awarded the Palmetto College Denise R. Shaw Excellence in Scholarship Award. The UofSC Office of the Vice President for Research hosts the RISE grant program, a competitive program that funds faculty research and scholarly activities during the summer months. In FY2020-2021 four USCL faculty members were awarded RISE grants in the areas of Chemistry, Philosophy, Physics, and Native American Studies.

B. Public Infrastructure and Economic Development

3.1. Financial Stability and Community Partnerships

Besides education, USCL also contributes to the statewide enterprise objective of Public Infrastructure and Economic Development. The objective states, in part, that we should build a world-class and safe public infrastructure to enhance the quality of life of our citizens. One way we achieve this goal is to strengthen the campus' financial condition. We measure this in two ways. The first is to consider the USCL reserve-fund carry-forward amount. Our target is to increase this reserve so that we maintain an amount equal to or greater than three months of our operating cost. During FY2020-2021 USCL increased the reserve fund by 42% to \$3,770,203, far exceeding our stated target. Another measure we use is the expenses-to-budget ratio. This shows the relative size of the total expenses incurred compared to the total budget resources. A small ratio is desirable. In FY2020-2021 our expenses-to-budget ratio was 91.1%, far lower than the projected 103.6%. Our Budget Manager explained that we saved on travel and utilities, and improved collections to reduce bad debt expense.

During the November 2020 election, Lancaster County voters approved a referendum that included \$1 million to construct a safe crosswalk across Highway 9 that will connect USCL with the community, and an additional \$1 million to the USCL Educational Foundation for facility and infrastructure enhancements to expand the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program at USCL.

USCL also worked to improve both its physical and technical infrastructure. USCL began renovating Starr Hall, the building that holds student services and Student Life, installed a new solarium system for

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the YMCA natatorium, and repaved parking lots. USCL's Information Technology department upgraded student usage computers as well as classroom media computers, projectors, and media switches. Seven classrooms now have full digital capability. Faculty were provided with laptop or tablet computers, webcams and Zoom in order to conduct classes and communicate with students virtually. They upgraded internet access on campus. Wireless internet access was expanded to the two main outdoor areas on campus to allow students to work on assignments while social distancing.

The statewide enterprise objective also states that we should promote the state in global competitiveness as a location for business, investment, talent, innovation, and visitors. Through the Native American Studies Center (NASC), USCL contributes significantly to the City of Lancaster's downtown revitalization plan, which continues to be successful in attracting visitors, new businesses, and new investments to the Lancaster area. The NASC hosts a lunch-and-learn series, an artist-inresidence program, art gallery receptions, an archaeology lab, and arts and crafts shows that are open to the public. The staff also participate in city events, such as Scarecrows on Main in October and Christmas in the City in December, both intended to draw shoppers and tourists to downtown Lancaster. The NASC brings students of all ages downtown through K-12 field trips and USCL classes. Due to the pandemic, the NASC's physical location was closed during FY2020-2021. However, they continued to hold events via Zoom and interact with the public via social media platforms. In the spring the NASC accepted a few visitors by appointment. The NASC held five events and series during FY2020-2021: The Brent Burgin Lunch-and-Learn series, Native American Studies Week, Columbus Controversy Panel and Discussion, Traditional Catawba Online Art Series, and presentations by Alex Osborn the Artist-in-Residence. In total, the NASC had 1592 visitors in person and by Zoom. The NASC Assistant Director stated that they were able to develop an entirely new distant group of patrons who otherwise would not have been able to visit the NASC in person.

Summary

University of South Carolina Lancaster is vital to the education of South Carolinians in our service area. We provide accessible and affordable higher education led by staff and faculty who are experts in their fields. Beyond the classroom, we strive to develop the whole person through co-curricular and extracurricular activities. As an institution and as individuals, we work to enhance our community socially and economically. It is clear that members of our service area value our work: our enrollments are increasing steadily, and our finances are growing with them. We're also recognized by external reviewers as the #1 ranked community college in South Carolina, one of the top community colleges in the United States, and, in partnership with UofSC, providers of the #1 ranked RN program in South Carolina.
