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USC Lancaster Faculty Meeting Minutes February 11, 2022

CALL TO ORDER: A. Yingst, 1:00 PM

CORRECTION/APPROVAL OF MINUTES: The minutes of the Dec 3, 2021 faculty meeting were approved.

Financial Aid – Kenneth Cole.

- Presentation please see the video for the slides and complete content or request them from Cole.
- Cole presented some of the forms and information for advisors who may be filling out these forms. A concern is that the university needs to follow through with the regulations for funding. He also stressed that if anyone has questions to please contact him about the forms.
- Veterans Enrollment Certifications
 - Discussed within the presentation were student responsibilities and university/faculty responsibilities for filling out these forms and the certifications.
 - Cole shared the form and discussed possible ways to fill out the form, including information about 2-year and 4-year degrees and some of the issues centered around the forms.
 - An issue: Sometimes the student is repeating requirements they do not need or taking an extra course that does not meet the requirements of the program and is not "required" for the degree.
 - The forms are audited for these issues.
 - Verify the degree program and the courses are accurate and they are necessary to finish the degree, so these are required.
 - If the courses are not required, the VA will not pay for them.
 - Students can take extra courses, but they will not be paid for by the VA then.
 - Please see video for more information.
 - o Forms can be done through email, if through USC email address.
 - Please respond to these emails when they come through.
 - Cole discussed some of the consequences if there are errors on these forms.
 - Cole did clarify that we have not had a major audit finding in the 15 years or so he has worked here, but there was a recent finding.

 Some of the consequences include the school getting fined and student loses money and must pay it back.

Questions about the VA forms:

Alhaddad – does the course count for the 60 hrs elective requirement for the degree?

- Cole yes it can count, but if they meet those 60 hrs elective credit hours. If they meet that number, then the VA does not pay for any of the courses above 60 credits. There is nothing wrong with putting elective courses on there, but if the student misses the 60 credit hours of electives, then they do not get covered by VA.
- Yingst this is good and really specific information. Is there a way to condense this information and send this to the faculty at the same time as the VA forms.
- Cole I can create an instruction page that goes with the form. There is a form that goes with the student's form that they may not be giving to you.
- Alhaddad I think your instructions give us more information than the form that accompanies the VA file.
- Cole asked if this presentation will be sent to faculty with the minutes.
- Golonka clarified that this presentation will not be sent within the minutes unless it meets accessibility requirements.

Presentation continued:

- Financial Aid
 - Students must be degree seeking at USC Lancaster.
 - Financial Aid can only pay for the courses required for the degree taken through USCL or Palmetto College.
 - Maximum time frame review it is a way to catch students who are approaching end of financial aid.
 - Cole discussed how this is monitored and ways to help students. Please see the video.
 - Formula: Add current earned hours + current attempted hours
 - Once a student will have earned a number of hours, they will be sent an email.
 - A form must be completed by the student and advisor.
 - The advisor fills this form out. The student brings this form to the advisor when they receive an email notifying them about financial aid issues due to number of courses/credit hours.
 - The courses listed should be the ones that are specifically required to complete, and 3 hours of an AIU or another area is acceptable.
 - Cole checks to make sure that the total maximum credit hours for the degree sought (2-year, 4 year) is not exceeded.
 - Advisor needs to confirm the student is admitted to the degree program and list the courses necessary to graduate with that specific degree.
 - There are consequences if a student exceeds the maximum time frame including the university being fined and the student not receiving financial aid.

Questions About Financial Aid:

Johnson - So if they have only 1 remaining class (such as an AIU) for the associate degree while already having taken 75 or more credit hours, they can still receive financial aid at USCL? Cole – yes that is correct. They can take whatever courses they need. This is only making sure they do not go over the maximum credit hours they need.

Presentation continued:

- Financial Aid Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP)
 - SAP is required for federal and state financial aid. There are a number of requirements for the student. Please see the presentation.
 - The types of appeal processes were discussed: 2 Types Academic and Graduation
 Plan
 - o If approved, students can continue to receive financial aid and some state aid, but the student must follow the plan, and this is checked.
 - There are consequences to the student and institution if these are not followed.
 Please see the slides.
- The last item discussed was special enrollment requests. Please see the slides as transient students and guest students were discussed along with financial aid concerns.

Academic Success Center – Dr. Patrick Lawrence - report submitted (Appendix 3)

- First report as Director of ASC
- Highlights tutoring schedule issues early on, but the schedule is now online.
- Closed during spring break, but probably open during the first week of finals this year.
- Would like any feedback from faculty about what we need, what faculty want, etc.
- Overview of center.
 - On target with tutoring appointments
 - o Better than January 2021, and still below pre-COVID
 - Number of students we are able to see looks good.
 - Tutoring STEM fields, especially math. Writing tutors, including P. Lawrence.
 Also, we are offering zoom-based tutoring during any of the regular hours. This
 may work better for asynchronous courses. They can still receive tutoring
 through ASC.
 - We're looking at a couple of facility improvements for the center.

- With Palmetto College students, the way they access library resources is slightly different than how they access Medford Library resources. These students go through their home institution's library to access resources. This affects the databases.
- Problems that may have a fix if it is a Columbia student and they are taking a Lancaster class, if they request materials from Columbia, they have to contact the library to actually put that request in to get it sent here. If you have students in this situation, contact the librarians and they will help.

Safety Report – John Rutledge, CRASE report submitted (Appendix 7), and report via email:

"As a campus we have continued to have a very low almost non existent crime rate which is generally what occurs in colleges that do not have student housing. We do submit a report each year to the federal government which gives an overall review of any incidents that do occur on our campus. This report is found at the following link;

Currently a focus is on emergency management in general and prioritizing potential active shooter protocols to protect people. The focus is not based on a higher probability that we are under a greater threat being on a college campus. The basic survival strategies discussed in CRASE (Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events) classes are useful in any emergency situations we may encounter. The many studies of incidents of this type which are mass casualty situations have directed the development of training strategies that minimizes loss of life. Other similar training include basic first aid and stop the bleeding classes. You will find located around campus visual reminders of what works to save lives. I am attaching to this report a graphic on what CRASE instruction deals with as a tool. Please consider attending any of these types of training events when available. If you want to schedule the 1.5 hour CRASE training as a part of your class I will arrange either for myself or another certified CRASE instructor to conduct the class. "

- **SACS COC in-person visit**. While we have completed fully our requirements with SACS COC for reaccreditation and we have received the official letter (attached to this report) from the SACS COC office reaffirming our accreditation, we still have to go through an in-person visit with SACS COC officials on April 26-28, 2022. Someone from the on-site team will visit Lancaster on April 27. We will know more about this visit, its itinerary and scope, in the next several weeks.

All institutions are requested to submit an 'Impact Report of the Quality Enhancement Plan on Student Learning' as part of their 'Fifth-Year Interim Report' due five years before their next reaffirmation review. Institutions will be notified 11 months in advance by the President of SACSCOC regarding its specific due date. Directions for completion of the report will be included with the notification.

REPORT TO THE FACULTY ORGANIZATION February 11, 2022

- 1. Spring 2022 Advising and Registration Update.
 - **a.** As of February 7, **501 traditional degree-seeking** students have been registered compared to **517** this time last year. 433 were registered on November 29. Our goal this year was 508 continuing students.
 - **b.** As of February 7, **1003 dual enrollment** students have been registered compared to **976** this time last year. On November 29, 703 dual enrollment students were registered. Our goal this year was 915.
 - c. As of February 8, BOL enrollment is 39 (43 last year); BLS enrollment is 39 (55 last year).
- 2. **USCL Faculty Forums.** Forums run @noon on Zoom on FO Fridays. If you have some ideas for a presentation during Spring 2022, please let me know. Note that this does not have to be a formal talk. Roundtables and open-ended discussions are most welcome!

3. Faculty Reviews Matters.

- **a.** Faculty eligible for promotion or change to senior instructor status will be notified by March 1. March 15 is the deadline to declare intent to undergo reviews during the 2022-2023 year. Please note that intent statements will be made on a form that will be sent to faculty on March 1.
- **b.** Thanks to all those who have volunteered to be part of the Evaluation Committee's pilot project for an innovative and new approach to peer review. Please reach out to Andy Yingst if you would like to join this process.

- 4. **Fall 2022 Course Schedules.** Thanks so much to all faculty for working collaboratively on the schedules. Our team effort has helped us to address diverse student demands. Thanks to Shemsi Alhaddad for valuable institutional research on course enrollment patterns. Special kudos to the Division Chairs for the significant amount of work that they put into these efforts. Right now, approximately 30% of fall courses are in an online modality. Once we load the final schedule into Banner, I will have more a more precise breakdown.
- 5. **Travel Study Proposals.** The Student Affairs Committee has put out a call for applications Please complete and submit the online form (https://tinyurl.com/travelstudyproposal) by 5 pm on March 15, 2022. *Note: You will be prompted to log-in with your USC username and password.
- 6. **Open Student Affairs Positions**. We have open positions for a Counselor and a Student Life Director. For the Counselor position, I am in discussions with psychology faculty and the Hiring Priorities Committee about possibly building this into a psychology faculty position. We are waiting on Columbia approval for the Student Life Director position. I expect that we will commence that search near March 1.
- 7. **Hardship Withdrawal Form.** The Academic Petitions and Grade Change Committee has developed a few revisions to the hardship withdrawal form to make more explicit the points that students must address when they submit these requests. These changes will be sent out ahead of the next faculty meeting for FO consideration.
- 8. **CTE Mental Health and Wellbeing Competency Program.** University of South Carolina's Center for Teaching Excellence is offering a fully online certificate program for faculty around matters of student mental health. 

Monthly Overview

We had a rocky start to the semester because of some unavoidable issues scheduling tutors. This required us to revise the schedule multiple times to meet student demand as well as possible. We now have our final schedule for the semester and are rolling along smoothly. This process has been a challenge as I get my bearings in my new role as Director, but Elaine Connor, our Academic Success Coordinator, has been invaluable. We look forward to a stronger February and hope to see the Center humming with activity.

In January, we also had a number of small improvements to improve conditions for staff, such as adding an air purifier and cleaning the carpets. We anticipate additional improvements between now and early summer, including painting and tech upgrades.

Summary of Tutoring Data

Year-to-year trends: We appear to be beating January 2021 by a little bit in terms of how many tutoring sessions we're holding and how many individual students we're serving. However, we're faring much worse compared to January 2020. This tells me we're gradually coming back from COVID lows but that we still have a way to go before we reach pre-COVID levels.

Month-to-month trends: The trends here are murky. The university was closed for part of December and January, making the raw totals misleading. Additionally, in December, final exams are due and tutoring demand is relatively high, whereas in January most classes do not have major assignments due, so tutoring demand is low. The fact that we're holding slightly more tutoring sessions than December makes me optimistic that we may see greater demand this year, but it's too early to tell.

Session distribution trends: We're seeing high demand for STEM tutoring, especially math, and we have an overwhelming preference for in-person sessions. These trends will inform future staffing and scheduling decisions.





Those who did not choose to receive the 2021 W-2 electronically will receive their copy via mail. It was mailed to the home address that is stored in the HR/Payroll system.

Questions about W-2s should be directed to the USC Payroll Department via email uscpay@mailbox.sc.edu or telephone 803-777-4227. When communicating with the USC Payroll Department share your legal name and USC ID so that you may be easily identified and assisted efficiently.

2) State Health Plan primary members can request reimbursement for over-the-counter Covid-19 tests authorized by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

Effective January 28, 2022, claims will be processed under the Plan's pharmacy benefit through Express Scripts.

Plan members should follow the following steps when purchasing Over-the-counter Covid-19 tests.

- Members should call their local network pharmacy to see if they have over-the-counter COVID-19 tests available.
- At the local network pharmacy, members should take the COVID-19 test **to the pharmacy counter just like they would when filling a prescription.** *Members should not use the regular checkout lane.*

Members should show the pharmacy their Express Scripts identification card.

• The over-the-counter COVID-19 test should automatically ring up at no cost to the member, which means the member does not need to file a claim.

USC Lancaster Faculty Organization Campus Technology Update

February 11, 2022

Highlights

- Communications have worked to diversify the path the campus intranet circuit follows back to USC Columbia, and then from there to the internet. The Lancaster Campus is scheduled for diversification of its circuit route on 2/16/2022. The attached slide shows both the primary path (in red) and diversified path (in green). The diversification route will be enabled at Comporium's (NOC) Network Operations Center in Lancaster and will activate automatically if there is a break/cut on the primary path. This will help minimize the outages of this type we have experienced over the past few years. If future outages occur, it will be due to an equipment failure or a break/cut in the infrastructure inside the "last mile" between Comporium's NOC and 476 Hubbard Drive. Segra/Comporium is scheduling a 1 hour maintenance window on 2/16/2022 at 7:00 PM EST to implement diversification. There may be brief interruptions in internet access during this maintenance window next week.
- > Classroom Audio/Video upgrades: An installation crew from Clark Powell and Associates will be on campus beginning Monday, February 28 and will remain onsite until Friday, April 29 to install new classroom A/V equipment in Founders Hall, Bradley and the NASC. Based on the timeline of the projects, the number of classrooms, and the invoice and payment deadlines for the funding, there wasn't any flexibility with the installation schedule. Many of the equipment items were on back order for months due to supply chain issues and finally started arriving at the vendor's location in late December, 2021. One classroom is scheduled per day for installation, (22) of the (36) installations will not impact in person class meetings. There will be (14) classroom installations that will require a few classes be moved to another room for that classroom's installation day. The detailed installation schedule for the (36) classrooms is included with my report. The schedule was developed using current classroom schedules in Banner and information from Academic Affairs. Some adjustments can possibly be made based on any feedback from the Faculty Organization. Once the project starts, I will provide the upcoming week's room installation schedule to Faculty and Staff by 12:00pm each Thursday throughout the duration of the project, and make sure information is posted by the classroom doors the Friday before a classroom is installed.



Retention

REPORT TO THE FACULTY ORGANIZATION February 11, 2022

Opportunity Scholars Program:

- We currently are serving 137 students from low-income, first generation, or disabled backgrounds. We need a minimum of 28 additional eligible students, who will be double qualifiers (meaning both low-income and first generation) prior to the end of August 2022 to meet our federally mandated enrollment requirement of 165 participants.
- 48 OSP students have been recognized as part of either the Fall 2021 President's or Dean's Honor Lists, or **36% of our current project enrollment**.

Palmetto College Academic Advisory Committee Report January 28, 2022; next meeting not scheduled yet

- **USCL is still underrepresented** on the committee, and an appointee slot is open. Please let John Catalano or Susan Elkins know if you'd like to serve.
- We discussed systems for determining **who'll teach P-section courses** that aren't taught by Columbia-based faculty; right now those spots are usually assigned first-come first-served. We may end up asking cross-campus faculty in departments that have faculty competing for limited spots to meet and come up with faculty rotation plans.
- Steve Lowe will pilot integrating P-section course listings with a few non-P-section course listings on Banner; this summer.
- We have a meeting of faculty involved in PALM courses scheduled for Feb. 25. The main topic: how to reduce the number of students who have trouble making it through PALM 401 (Senior Capstone), or PALM 493 (South Carolina Studies). South Carolina Studies turns out to have higher DFW rates.
- We're still looking at merging sections of online P-section courses. This would make
 enrollment in P-section courses first-come first-served. It's still unclear whether this
 would present problems for some of the campuses, especially Union, and it's unlikely
 that this would happen until after advising and enrollment for fall 2022.
- We're considering the possibility of an internship course for two-year degrees.
- We're still looking at updates to the <u>BOL</u>. Some of its courses haven't been offered in a while and may be purged from the list, including HRTM 344, Personnel Organization and Supervision; MGMT 472, Entrepreneurship and Small Business; and PSYC 360, Applied Psychology. Let me know if you're interested in teaching any of them. While that won't guarantee that they'll be on the schedule, it will save them from the purge list for now.

Please also let me know if you have more ideas for substitutions, additions, or purges. Substitutions already on our list: MKTG 350 for JOUR 201, SPTE 240 for ACCT 324, FINA 363 in Law/Policy/Orgs, MGMT 478 in Workplace Dynamics, ITEC 242 for ENGL 463, HPEB 321 in Workplace Dynamics or Employer/Employees, STAT 205/206 or MGSC 291 for SOCY 392 (recently SOCY 220), MGSC 290 for ITEC 264.

Please get in touch if you have ideas or questions, and thanks to those of you who've done that already.

The purpose of this form is to encourage student-athletes to clearly communicate athletic status and game/practice schedules with their instructors. By signing the form, you are only agreeing that the student has identified themselves as a student-athlete and provided their game/practice schedule to you.

Timeline

For Spring 2022, we are piloting this form with the USCL Baseball team. Coach Calhoun distributed this form to the baseball players at the beginning of February 2022. Student-athletes must return this form to Coach Calhoun by March 1, 2022. The committee intends to meet again after March 1, to discuss any changes that need to be made to the process for the 2022-2023 academic year.

Student-Athlete Responsibilities

- 1. Fill out all information on the form. Faculty members should only have to add their signature and any comments to the form.
- 2. Provide instructors with copy of the official game schedule and practice schedule.
- 3. Return form to Nick Calhoun (Head Baseball Coach and Athletic Director)
- 4. Communicate with all instructors regarding make up work for each missed class period.

Faculty Responsibilities

We are only requesting that instructors sign the form to indicate that the athlete has spoken with you directly. As a courtesy, we have added an **optional** space for you to add any comments that will provide insight on the student-athlete's performance in your class. Comments or feedback may include attendance status (good/fair/poor); outside help/tutoring recommended; and/or overall performance in the course. This is intended to provide a convenient line of communication with the athletics department. **Comments are completely optional**.

<u>FERPA Concerns:</u> Student-athletes sign a FERPA waiver at the beginning of the academic year which allows faculty to communicate with coaches regarding academic performance. Our athletic coaches have a legitimate, vested academic interest in the academic performance of our student-athletes due to eligibility concerns. Dr. Lekan has been consulted on this and has confirmed that this is not a FERPA violation.
